Too bad it only happens once a year! With a monthly countdown, the farmers and animals tell tales about life on a farm, giving familiar fables a barnyard twist. During The Dog Days of Summer (August's fable), the animals cheer one another up—in the style of "Laugh-In"—proving that "laughter is the best medicine:" a scarecrow and crow perform a ventriloquist act and outwit the hungry fox: and the farm mouse croons a country song to his rapping city cousin. A dozen vignettes feature all of your favorite barnyard characters and blend humor, rhythmic elements, rapping, puppetry, poetry, song and storytelling to create a fast-paced, fun-filled show that is sure to delight. ## Aesop's Fable-ous Barnyard Bash

#### **CHARACTERS**

CASTING: The play calls for a cast of six, but if you cast each scene independently, you can have as many as 65 different actors. The cast can be any age, gender or race.

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#### March: It's All Relative

(CD track #8. CITY MOUSE enters wearing a baseball cap with mouse ears. COUNTRY MOUSE begins to sing in a country style.)

COUNTRY MOUSE. Yee haw!

IT'S MY COUSIN FROM THE CITY AS I LIVE AND BREATHE!

COME JOIN ME OVER HERE BENEATH THE SHADE OF THESE TREES!

(CITY MOUSE begins to sing in a hip-hop style. The downbeats are in bold.)

CITY MOUSE. Yo, how's it goin'? My country cousin showin' me the row he's been hoein'. I know it's been forever since we met—it's a crime (*Beat.*) —but I know ya gonna show me a remarkable time!

COUNTRY MOUSE. Yes, sir!

I GATHERED UP SOME CORN AND SOME CRUMBS AND SOME SEEDS,

THE FIXIN'S OF A MEAL COMPRISED OF ALL A MOUSE NEEDS.

SO SIT RIGHT DOWN MY CUZ FROM TOWN FROM WAY UP NORTHEAST.

I'VE PREPARED FOR YOU A LOVELY VIEW, A BAR-LEY BREW.

A CORN FONDUE, A SEEDLING STEW, LONG-OVER-DUE WELCOMING FEAST CITY MOUSE. Whoa, 'sup with that? That's not fit for a rat. (Beat.) Corn and crumbs are for the bums; we gotta fix that stat! You come with me and you will see the city's where it's at. Although the country's pleasant, you're eatin' like a peasant. In the city? Sittin' pretty. Each meal is like a present. There's cake and jam, and they bake ham with spices. Bam! Come on, let's scram.

COUNTRY MOUSE. Yee-haw!

ALTHOUGH I MIGHT BE COMFOR'BLE, THE PICKIN'S MIGHTY SLIM

I GUESS I BETTER PACK MY BAGS AND GO TO TOWN WITH HIM.

ENOUGH OF SEEDS I NEED TO FEED ON SOMETHING MORE THAN MEAD.

I'M HEADIN' TO THE CITY WHERE A BANQUET'S GUARANTEED.

(Haystack turns to reveal a dining room with a table filled with food.)

COUNTRY MOUSE (cont'd).

WOW!

CITY MOUSE. **See** all the **fin**ery, the **din**ery, all **mine** ya see.

COUTRY MOUSE. FOOD!

CITY MOUSE. Each meal is ecstasy. No specks to see. Sit next to me.

COUNTRY MOUSE.

DESSERT!

CITY MOUSE. **They** over**stock** it here. They **rock** it here, with **choc**olate here.

## COUNTRY MOUSE. LEFTOVERS!

CITY MOUSE. Each day a different take, sometimes it's cake or sirloin steak.

COUNTRY MOUSE.

CAT!

CITY MOUSE Scat!

(CAT appears. Chase music.)

CITY MOUSE (cont'd). Whoa, that was close. You and I were nearly toast; gotta keep my heart in check, or so my doctor diagnosed. Let's wait another minute—two or three at the most—and I'll resume my duties as your bona fide, certified, city-wide...

(CAT appears.)

COUNTRY MOUSE.

RUN AND HIDE!

(Chase music.)

COUNTRY MOUSE (cont'd). Whoo-whee!

I THANK YOU FOR THE VISIT, CONVERSATION, CHOW, AND CHEER.

ALTHOUGH I'D LIKE TO STAY I MUST SAY I DON'T LIKE IT HERE.

BUT NOW A LESSON DOES APPEAR TO WHICH WE MUST ADHERE—

BETTER CRUMBS IN COMFORT THAN FINERY WITH FEAR.

CITY MOUSE.

BETTER CRUMBS IN COMFORT THAN FINERY WITH FEAR.

(COUNTRY MOUSE and CITY MOUSE remove the March banner, revealing a banner that reads "April: Pay It Forward." On the back of the March banner is the moral "Better crumbs in comfort than feasting with concern." They show the moral to the audience and finish the song.)

#### BOTH.

BETTER CRUMBS IN COMFORT THAN FINERY WITH FEAR!

(Together, they hang the banner on the two hooks on the fence and exit.)

#### Not I, Said the Farmer (Part Two)

(FARMER BROWN enters.)

FARMER BROWN. Goodness gracious! Hey, everybody, come see!

(FARMERS BLUE, PINK, YELLOW, WHITE and RED enter.)

FARMER BROWN *(cont'd)*. Look! It's already April! My how time flies. We only have eight more months to prepare for the Barnyard Bash, and there's no time like the present to get started.

FARMER BLUE. Prepare?

FARMER PINK. The present?

FARMER YELLOW. Get started?

FARMER BROWN. Nothing on a farm happens quickly.

FARMER WHITE. True, but ...

FARMER BROWN. We need to plant the seeds to grow the wheat to get the grain to grind the flour to make the cake to take to the Barnyard Bash. So ...

#### (#9: "Not I, Part Two")

(CD track #9.)

FARMER BROWN (cont'd). Who will help me plant the seeds so we can grow some wheat?

FARMER RED. Not I, Farmer Brown

FARMER BROWN. Why not, Farmer Red?

FARMER RED. It's spring and my allergies went to my head. (Exits.)

FARMER BLUE. Not I, Farmer Brown.

FARMER BROWN. Farmer Blue, not you?

FARMER BLUE. I think I heard my milk cow moo. (Exits.)

FARMER PINK. Not I, Farmer Brown.

FARMER BROWN. Farmer Pink, why not?

FARMER PINK. It's time to take my horse for a trot. (Exits.)

FARMER YELLOW. Not I, Farmer Brown.

FARMER BROWN. Farmer Yellow, come on!

FARMER YELLOW. My favorite TV show is on. (Exits.)

FARMER WHITE. Not I, Farmer Brown.

FARMER BROWN. All right, Farmer White.

FARMER WHITE. I hope I'm not too impolite. (Exits.)

FARMER BROWN. Then I guess I'll do it myself! (Exits.)

#### **April: Pay It Forward**

(This scene is told through actions and animal sounds. CAT enters and walks across the stage meowing. The number of animal sounds is a suggestion; use as many sounds as needed to convey the characters' intentions.)

CAT. Mew. Meow. Mew. Meow. ("What a nice day!")

(CAT steps on a thorn.)

CAT (cont'd). Me-OW!!! Ow, ow, me-ow! ("Ouch, ouch, ouch!")

(MOUSE enters squeaking. MOUSE sees CAT and goes to her.)

MOUSE. Squeak, squeak. ("Hi, Cat!")

CAT. Me-OW! ("Ouch!")

MOUSE. Squeak, squeak? ("What's wrong?")

CAT. Me-OW! ("Look! There's a thorn in my paw!")

(MOUSE pulls out the thorn.)

MOUSE. Squeak, squeak! ("There you go!")

CAT. Meoooow. ("Thank you.")

MOUSE. Squeak, squeak. ("Don't mention it.")

(MOUSE exits. DOG enters, playing with a balloon. The balloon floats away and lands on the barn roof.)

DOG. Roof! Roof! ("Hey, balloon, come back here.")

CAT. Meow. ("Hi, dog.")

DOG. Roof! ("Help me.")

CAT. Meow? ("What's wrong?")

DOG. Roof! Roof!!! ("Look up there on the roof!")

CAT. Meow! ("Oh, I see.")

(CAT climbs on fence, scales the barn and gets DOG's balloon.)

DOG. Roof! Roof! ("Thank you, Cat!")

CAT. Meow. ("Don't mention it.")

(CAT exits. DUCK enters pulling a duckling on the string. Several other ducklings roll out in different directions.)

DUCK. Quack! Quack! Quack! ("Get in a line, little ducklings!")

DOG. Roof! Roof! ("Hi, Duck!")

DUCK. Quack! Quack! ("Help me, Dog!")

DOG. Roof! Roof, roof! ("Come on, ducklings, move along; listen to your mother.")

(DOG herds the ducklings into a line, attaching a hook at the front of each duckling to an eye hook at the tail of each duckling. They form a train that DUCK can pull.)

DUCK. Quack, quack, quack, quack! ("Thanks, Dog!") DOG. Roof, roof. ("Don't mention it.")

(DOG exits. PIG enters grunting and lies down in the dirt. He's hot.)

PIG. Oink. Oink. ("Whew! It sure is hot.")

DUCK. Quack, quack! ("Hi, Pig!")

PIG. Oink. ("I'm about to die from this heat.")

DUCK. Quack! Quack! ("I'll help you!")

(DUCK gets a pail of water from the well and pours it on PIG.

CD track #10: Water Pouring.

PIG rolls around splashing water on himself.)

PIG. Oink! Oink! Oink! ("Ah, much better! Thank you, Duck!")
DUCK. Quack, quack, quack. ("Don't mention it, Pig. Come along, ducklings.")

(DUCK exits, pulling her train of ducklings. COW pokes his head out of the barn window. COW's bell falls to the ground where he can't reach it.)

COW. Mooooooo! ("I can't reach it.")

PIG. Oink, oink! ("Hi, Cow!")

COW. Mooooooooooooo! ("Can't you see I'm distressed?")

PIG. Oink? Oink? ("What's wrong.")

COW. Mooooooooooooo! Moo! ("My bell fell. Can you get it for me?")

(PIG picks up bell and hands it to COW.)

PIG. Oink! ("Here it is.")

COW. Moo, moo! ("Thank you!")

PIG. Oink. ("Don't mention it.")

(PIG exits. MOUSE enters searching for food, smacking her lips.)

MOUSE. Squeak, squeak. ("Boy, I sure could use a bite to eat right about now.")

COW. Moo-whooo! ("Yoo-hoo!")

MOUSE. Squeak. ("I'm a bit peckish.")

(COW hands some cheese to MOUSE.)

COW. Moo? ("You want some?")

MOUSE. Squeak! Squeak! ("Yippee! My favorite!")

(MOUSE takes the cheese and removes the April banner, revealing a banner that reads "May: Full of Hot Air." On the back of the April banner is the moral "One good turn deserves another." MOUSE shows the moral to the audience and reads it aloud.)

MOUSE *(cont'd)*. Squeak, squeak, squeak, squeak, squeak, squeak, squeak. *(Clears throat.)* One good turn deserves another.
