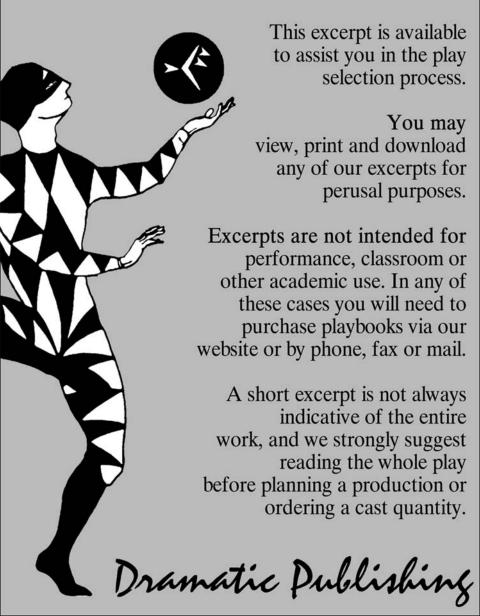
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RED RIDING HOOD: A Vaudeville Romp!

SETTING: One backdrop depicting both city and park.

Street lamp and park bench on set. Lights out. Music:

"OFFICER O'MALLEY." Lights up slowly. Enter OFFICER O'MALLEY. Music continues under as OFFICER O'MALLEY makes his rounds.

O'MALLEY. Top of the morning to you, lads and lassies. 'Tis I! Officer Patrick O'Malley at your service. I am the cop on the beat what keeps our fine city safe and sound. (Music fades.) From Broadway to the river, all the way through Central Park, to Saint James Court, and every block between! That's where you'll find me, Patty O'Malley... keeping our dear, sweet city safe from harm.

(MUSIC 1: "OFFICER O'MALLEY")

O'MALLEY.

WHEN OFFICER O'MALLEY'S ON THE BEAT, YOU WON'T FIND A FELON ON THE STREET. YOU WON'T FIND A CRIMINAL, PICKPOCKET OR THUG.

THEY DISAPPEARS WHEN I'M AROUND, 'CAUSE I KNOWS EVERY MUG.

WHEN OFFICER O'MALLEY'S ON THE BLOCK MY WHISTLE BLOWS; EVERY BANDIT STOPS. I LOCK UP EVERY RASCAL, GANGSTER-TYPE AND THIEF WHEN OFFICER O'MALLEY'S ON THE BEAT.

(Enter, Keystone Cops-style, OFFICERS 1, 2 and 3. Enter ADDITIONAL OFFICERS if applicable.)

O'MALLEY.
DON'T LOITER TODAY

OFFICERS (spoken). Don't loiter today.

O'MALLEY.
MOVE ALONG I SAY.

OFFICERS (spoken). Move along I say.

O'MALLEY.
SHOULDN'T YOU BE IN SCHOOL?

OFFICERS (spoken). ... be in school?

ALL (includes O'MALLEY).

NEVER, NEVER BREAK A GOLDEN RULE

(Break. Enter ROBBERS, CRIMINALS and screaming VICTIMS if applicable. Mayhem ensues.)

ALL.

IF YOU'RE CAUGHT RED-HANDED IN FELONIOUS ASSAULT, HE WON'T BUY

OFFICER 1 (spoken). I did it, but it's not my fault.

OFFICER 2. Mom made me eat spinach.

OFFICER 3. Dad made me go to school.

OFFICERS.

IS IT ANY WONDER WE'RE BREAKING ALL THE RIJLES?

ALL.

NEVER, NEVER, NEVER BREAK A GOLDEN RULE.

OFFICER O'MALLEY.

(Exit OFFICERS—Keystone Cops-style. Exit ADDI-TIONAL OFFICERS, ROBBERS, CRIMINALS and VIC- TIMS at same time. Justice has been served. Music out. O'MALLEY waves good-bye.)

O'MALLEY. Good day to you, laddies! Isn't that strange? Every time I sing me favorite song... they seem to appear out of nowhere and join right in with me! Hmmmmm. I'll have to look into that. (Music: A "whistling" version of "GRANDMA'S HOUSE.") Well, I'll be the shamrock on Saint Patty's miter if that doesn't sound like the pride of the neighborhood's a-coming this way!

(Enter RED RIDING HOOD.)

RED. Good morning, Officer O'Malley.

(Music out.)

O'MALLEY. If it isn't little Red Riding Hood! Top of the morning to you, me lass. Where have you been so bright and early?

RED. Down to the river watching the boats. I even saw the Steamer Avalon.

O'MALLEY. Red Riding Hood, I pray you were not by yourself.

RED. Oh, no, Officer O'Malley.

O'MALLEY. Then who was it was with you?

RED. The McGallaghers...Kelly and Timmy's mother took us to the wharf to watch the steamboats. We planned to leave so early that Mother packed for me a breakfast of fresh soda bread and apples. We rode the Toonerville Trolley all the way there and back again!

O'MALLEY. Sounds like you've had quite the day already!

- RED. It's been the most wonderful day, it has!... The most wonderful day!
- O'MALLEY. Then come along, child, I'll be walking with you the rest of the way home.
- RED. Thank you, Officer O'Malley.
- O'MALLEY. 'Tis my pleasure, dear Red, for it is the duty of a public servant to make sure all citizens are safe... especially the children.
- RED. However, one day I would like to be trusted enough to walk home by myself. But alas, no matter how hard I beg, Mother never lets me go anywhere alone. She says I'm not old enough! Patti Collins is two years younger than me and she's been walking by herself for years!... While I can't walk out the front door without everyone in the neighborhood watching me.
- O'MALLEY. What would the world be without neighbors looking out for one another?
- RED. The world would be a wonderful place without so many busybodies spying on you!

MOTHER (offstage). Red...Red! Red Riding Hood!

RED. It's Mother! I do hope I'm not late.

(Enter MOTHER carrying basket of goodies.)

RED. I'm not late, am I, Mother?

(MOTHER and RED hug.)

MOTHER. Not at all, dear. But Charles, the postman, just told me that Granny wasn't feeling very well when he saw her this morning.
