ROMEO AND JULIET TOGETHER (AND ALIVE!) AT LAST

Characters: 14m, 12w, 9 m or w; extras, if desired (Doublecasting: 9m, 9w, 6 m or w)

The South Orange River Middle School Eighth Graders

PETE SALTZ, a disheveled poet, in love with Anabell, but too shy to look at her

ED SITROW, Pete's best friend, determined to bring Pete and Anabell together

ANABELL STACKPOOLE, a bookworm, in love with Pete, but too shy to speak to him

*RADOSH, Ed's friend, sensible, plays Benvolio in Act II

TOM HAYS, Ed's friend, given to weird hairdos, plays Friar in Act II

LUCY NEBLET, the prettiest girl in the class, runs music in Act II

PRISCILLA BLACK, Anabell's best friend, plays Nurse in Act II

ALBERT HAMILTON, bully, good-looking -- and a pyromaniac; plays Tybalt in Act II

* SONDSTROM, Hamilton's sidekick, works lights backstage in Act II

CINDY HUBER, an admirer of Hamilton and one of the Party People

MARY DAVIS, an admirer of Hamilton and one of the Party People

- * SAM PETTRY, Ed's friend, very laid-back, builds set and plays Mercutio in Act II
- * FITZSIMMONS, in charge of make-up; one of the Party People

JESSIE BOLIN, bright clothes, lots of rattling jewelry, designs costumes for play

- * MARKS, a friend of Hamilton, one of the Party People
- * ELISCUE, friend of Hamilton, one of the Party People

AMY JEFFERSON, scheduled to play Lady Capulet in Act II, but gets sick

- * BARISH, builds set, plays Capulet in Act II
- * DUBOIS, builds set, plays Balthasar in Act II and on of the Party People
- * PARKS, "Chorus" in Act II and one of the Party People
- * MILES, handles props in Act II and one of the Party People

(* may be played by male or female actors)

Others

MR. SULLIVAN, S.O.R. Middle School principal, upbeat, slow to anger MRS. BACON, language arts teacher, wears flowery dresses, enthusiastic, likeable BETSY HAYS, 6th grader, Tom's little sister, has a crush on Ed, really needs her glasses

PARTY PEOPLE (may be in both acts, with Act II a parody of their Act I perfection)

Time: The present.

Place: In and around South Orange River Middle School. All first act locations can be indicated by area staging and simple set pieces. The beginning of the second act may be played in front of the curtain, which then opens to reveal the S.O.R. assembly room stage with portions of the right and left wing areas visible and flats borrowed from the seventh graders' production of "Washington Crossing the Delaware," depicting evergreen trees and log cabins. All scenes should flow into one another, with transitions marked by music and lighting changes.

Summary: The road to farce is paved with good intentions. Eighth-graders Pete Saltz and Anabell Stackpoole are in love, but terribly shy. Classmates Ed Sitrow, Lucy Neblet, and others decide to stage a performance of ROMEO AND JULIET to bring the two together. Lack of expertise, only two weeks of rehearsal, and a classmate's villainy threaten their production every step of the way. But love triumphs in spite of everything -- or maybe because of it.

Playing time: about 90 minutes

ACT I Scene 1

Time: Before school.

Place: Mrs. Bacon's Language Arts Classroom

At RISE: MUSIC. LIGHTS come up on Mrs. Bacon's desk at center and three classroom chairs and desks right of center. A wooden stand holds a large dictionary left of center. PETE enters left and lumbers across stage, wearing a backpack, nibbling a bagel, and lost in thought. Half of his shirttail hangs out; his pants are beltless and in constant need of hitching up. He stops, looks around as if not sure where he is, runs his hand through his uncombed hair, then continues forward and takes a seat at far right. Holding the bagel in his teeth, he takes a notebook and pencil out of his backpack and begins scribbling feverishly, occasionally brushing crumbs off his work. ED enters and sees him. MUSIC fades.

ED

Hey, Saltz!

(No response.)

What gives? You're never early for class. Mrs. Bacon isn't even here yet.

(takes off his backpack and sits in the center seat,

next to PETE. ED tries to see what PETE's writing, but PETE

hides it with his bagel hand and goes on scribbling.)

Homework?

PETE

Mind your own business.	
Are you mad at me?	ED
No.	PETE
Then what's up?	ED
You wouldn't understand.	PETE
What wouldn't I understand?	ED
Nothing.	PETE
How can I not understand nothing? Do	ED <u>you</u> understand?
No.	PETE
So give me a try. (PETE considers it, but so Hey, I'm your best friend, remember?"	ED hakes his head "no.)
(a deep sigh, and then) What do you think of Anabell Stackpool	PETE e?
(surprised) Stackpoole?	ED
Yeah. Anabell Stackpoole.	PETE
What about her?	ED
I like her.	PETE

ED Really? (PETE nods, looking a bit ill.) Since when? PETE (thinks it over, and then --) Two days ago. ED What happened two days ago? **PETE** It . . . ED It? **PETE** ... just happened. ED Does she like you? **PETE** She doesn't even notice me. ED Have you tried talking to her? **PETE** (aghast) No! ED Want me to talk to her? **PETE** NO! ED Okay, okay! So what are you going to do about it? PETE (shrugs, then --) I wrote a poem.

(hands ED the poem he's been writing)

ED

(reading, dramatically)

There once was a fair beauty named Anabell --

PETE

Not so loud!

ED

(in a mock whisper)

For whom Pete Saltz, truly, in love fell.

But when he offered his heart,

She jumped up with a start,

And said, "I have to go now because I just

heard the end-of-class-bell.

(ED considers this a minute. Unnoticed by the boys, ANABELL enters left, her nose buried in a book, a historical romance. Meanwhile, the truth dawns on ED.)

Saltz! You're in love!

PETE

(Gives ED a woeful look, then quickly buries his face in the notebook. In a terrified whimper --)

She's here.

ED

Who's here?

(PETE turns away and points back over his head as ANABELL, still absorbed in her book, takes the empty seat beside ED. ED speaks to PETE with exaggerated secrecy.)

Oooooh. Stackpoole.

(PETE puts his hand down and hunches over his notebook.) If you like her so much, why don't you talk to her?

PETE

(mumbling)

I'm busy.

ED

(rolls his eyes and turns toward ANABELL, appraising her for a moment and then --)

That book -- is it any good?

ANABELL

(ANABELL nervously looks at him, looks at her book, looks at him again, then speaks

Yes.	in a tiny, timid voice.)
You read a lot	ED t, don't you?
Yes.	ANABELL (warming, just a bit)
So does Saltz	ED (tilting his head toward PETE)
What is "love"	(A flicker of interest in ANABELL'S eyes, followed quickly by acute shyness. She buries her nose in her book and ignores ED, who looks from her to the similarly unavailable PETE and back again a time or two, tapping his fingers on his desk. Then, to audience) 17 Real love. I'm not sure I know. (ANABELL and PETE shoot him twin looks of alarm and dive back into their books. Unaware of their reaction, absorbed in his own curiosity, he stands up, crosses to the dictionary, flips pages in search of "love," and begins reading.) traction, desire, or affection felt for a person who arouses delight (As he reads, HAYS and RADOSH enter left. Except where otherwise indicated, ANABELL and PETE are unaware of the others' conversation, but very aware that there is nothing but empty space between them. Now and then, they can't resist a peek in each other's direction, but absolutely avoid eye contact.)
How's it going	RADOSH , Sitrow?
Hey, Radosh.	ED How ya doin', Hays?
What's up?	HAYS

(THEY stare at him in amazement.)

You're not going to believe this -- Saltz is in love.

ED

Really?	RADOSH	
Really.	ED	
With someone	HAYS	
Of course, with	ED someone.	
Who?	RADOSH	
Anabell Stackp	ED oole.

RADOSH

Me, neither.
Good thing we're going to school.
ED It takes a whole lot of energy to be in love.
Not to mention guts. RADOSH
Yeah, and there sits my best friend, sunk in a pit of "sympathetic interest." He needs help.
(THEY gaze across the room at ANABELL and PETE. PETE takes out a peanut butter cookie and begins munching on it while he writes.)
HAYS (after a beat) You know, they don't look like they're in love.
Saltz is.
HAYS What about Stackpoole? Is she in love with him?
I'm not sure.
RADOSH Maybe before we offer any help, you should find out.
You could ask her.
No way!
Then ask Lucy Neblet.
ED (visibly uncomfortable with this suggestion) What?

RADOSH

Lucy Neblet. If there's anything like that going on in this class, Neblet would know.

HAYS

He's right. Ask Lucy Neblet.

ED

Yeah, but --

RADOSH

What?

ED

(moves away, avoiding their gaze) It's one thing to talk about love with guys. With girls, it's harder.

RADOSH

Do you want to help Saltz or don't you?

ED

Sure I do, but . . . Lucy Neblet?

HAYS

What's wrong with Lucy Neblet?

ED

Nothing.

(a beat, then, to audience, plaintively --)

That's the problem.

(ED freezes, contemplating that realization. RADOSH and HAYS freeze, looking at him quizzically. PETE and ANABELL freeze, not looking at one another. MUSIC. BLACKOUT. End of Scene l.)

Scene 2

Time: Later that day

Place: In front of LUCY'S locker

At Rise: MUSIC. As LIGHTS come up, LUCY enters and opens her locker. She primps in front of a mirror hanging inside the door. ED enters, hesitantly approaching her. MUSIC fades.

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(with a last pat to her already perfect hair)
Something the matter, Ed?

LUCY Uh-huh. Only nobody in our class agreed with her.
ED Right. But she said we'd understand it better if we could see it on stage.
LUCY So?
ED So why not put the play on? We could get Saltz to be Romeo
